

Anderson displays interactive art

NARROWSBURG, NY — “New Thought Forms,” an exhibit of interactive sculpture by Kathleen Anderson, will open with a reception on Friday, April 16 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Delaware Arts Center Gallery, 37 Main Street. The show is open through May 7. The Ill Winds Chamber Ensemble will play for the opening reception.

Anderson’s inventive and innovative work is part sculpture, part object and part device. Always thought provoking and often filled with humor, her sculptures put the viewers in touch with themselves and others. One piece invites two people to enter two separate cubicles attached by transparent silk tubing, through which the couple faces each other. The tubing restricts the field of vision, forcing the couple to engage in close eye-to-eye contact. Another piece connects two people’s fingertips with copper caps attached by copper wire. Copper amplifies psychic thought and facilitates exchange when the couple sits attached.

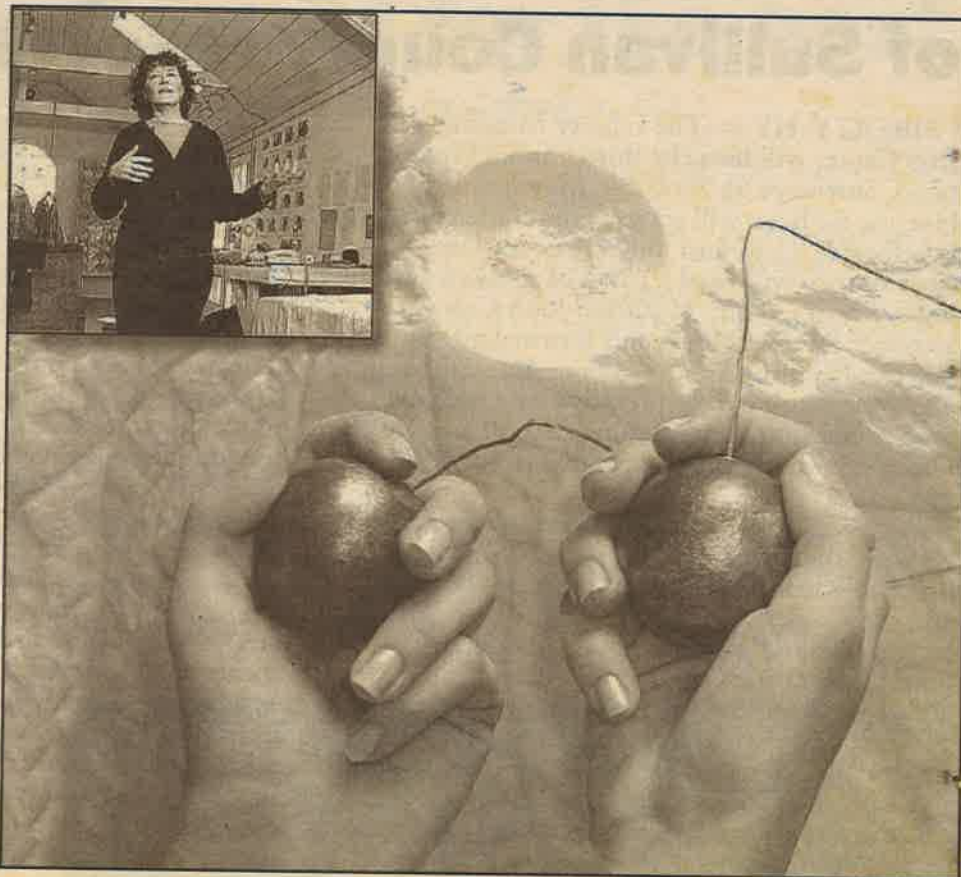
Anderson received her education at New School for Social Research,

Santa Barbara City College, Southern CT State University and Dean Jr. College.

She has had solo exhibitions of her work at Stephen Gang Gallery; CJP International; Sojourner Library at SUNY New Paltz, Cazenovia College and Sarah Doyle Gallery. Anderson has also participated in numerous group shows including Littlejohn Contemporary and Soho 20, New Jersey Center for Visual Arts, Delaware Center for Contemporary Art, Aldrich Museum of Contemporary Art, and Artists in the Marketplace, Bronx Museum of the Arts. She is the recipient of several grants and awards: SOS New York Foundation for the Arts, Andy Warhol Foundation Grant, and Artists Space Individual Artist Grant.

Gallery hours are Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The exhibit is sponsored by the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance and is made possible in part by funding from the New York State Council for the Arts.
