An Evening with Victor Faccinto

Last November the Department of Film received a note from a young filmmaker who had just moved to New York from the West Coast. Victor Faccinto wrote; "Although the total running time of my films is not long, the films represent the last five years of my work. My most recent film, SHAMELESS, took me close to two years to complete, due mainly to the fact I work alone, and with very primitive equipment... I have come to realize my films tend to alienate a general audience, but this is not my intention. I made the films as personal psychological explorations, and although I have not always been pleased by what I have found, I found out a lot. I am also actively involved with painting...It was an original desire to make my paintings move that led me into animation... I had very little technical film knowledge when I began animating my emotional interior. WHERE IS IT ALL GOING?, WHERE DID IT ALL COME FROM? being my first film was, as well, my first animation. Relatively isolated in Sacramento, California for the last ten years, most of what I have learned was by accident. I moved to New York City last spring, and the access to independent films has more than compensated for the trials of big city life. I am presently working on a new film...dealing with refilming scratched, clear film and the resulting images. Quite a change in format, but mentally just an extension of my past visions."

VICTOR FACCINTO was born in California (1945); he attended California State University in Sacramento where he earned a B.A. in Psychology and an M.A. in Art.
