WHAT HAPPENED IS SO PROFOUNDLY DISTURBING. not just because of the loss of life, but because it is indicative of how abhorrently disfigured humankind's self-image has become. But for me to try to deal with the events of 9/11 in an overt way in my work – in terms of imagery or imposed content – would be to presume I have fully grasped the significance of those events. In my work I aspire to transcend barriers and presumptions and prejudice, in defiance of my ego. allowing events to assert themselves, to name them-

selves. The actions and counteractions of both sides in the current battle totally contradict this way of functioning in the world. I believe it will affect my work for a long time to come in ways I cannot anticipate. I hope that it ultimately strengthens my resolve and my beliefs in the capacity for transcendence that we each have as individuals. I really want the brutality we have experienced to change us. If it does not. I fear we may be beyond help. no matter which side "wins."
