My work is heavily influenced by calligraphy, which I use to create abstracted forms and patterns. I find the fluidity and grace of calligraphy to be an inspiring source of visual language. My art often features sweeping curves and intricate details that are reminiscent of traditional calligraphic script.

My art is also inspired by art history. I draw upon the techniques and aesthetics of various art movements, such as the Renaissance, Baroque, and Rococo periods. I am especially drawn to the ornate and intricate details of these eras, which I often incorporate into my artwork.
