
Juror Statement.




The theme POP! Art with mass appeal was an exciting one for me to explore as some of my favorite artists and works in the Hirshhorn collection come from the Pop art tradition: Keith Haring, James Rosenquist, Andy Warhol, Claus Oldenburg as well as lesser-known names like Larry Rivers and Roslyn Drexler. I saw the influence of and homage to these and other artists in the great variety of submissions I reviewed. I responded enthusiastically to the mix of mass media, capitalist, pop culture and social commentary that the artists in this show are exploring in ways both serious and playful through their art. Pop art is notable for making "art" feel more relatable and accessible and the submissions to this exhibition are no exception.

The artworks I selected highlight themes, ideas, items, and cultural touchstones that we all have a connection to – whether it offers us a new way of looking at an everyday object, reminiscent of a beloved movie character or musician, or using humor to comment on the state of the world and how we see ourselves. Many of the works in this show are colorful and fun but that does not mean that they are not also serious or responding to complicated social issues.






The presentation of the faux commodity products invite viewers to witness and question the ways in which products and marketing promise an advantage, a tangible connection to power and social mobility through assimilation and conformity.

I place myself in my work as both the objectified and objectifier and aim to mirror the hidden, often shameful practices and messaging around beauty, blackness, youth and power. The work doesn't point fingers, instead it is an opening, an opportunity to take an unflinching look at the aesthetic standards we often co-create and blindly sustain.

Letting go of the rules allows the fabric to speak through texture, color, and design. Starting with a leaf, flower, or 'weed' in the garden studied and tended over many years, seeing them in every light and season her creations show aspects of the natural world only a few stop to observe, with intense dives into nature from a botanical perspective using natural and sometimes unconventional colors that only the bees can see.

As the flower series progressed, the designs have been reduced to more abstract forms, finding the essence of the structure. Using the inherent stiffness of the fabrics, batting, and dense quilting along with an occasional internal wire structure allows the creations to escape the boundaries of the surface to become sculptures. Pulling from a large collection of fabric, from traditional quilting and upholstery fabric to recycled designer samples, and various pieces of cloth bringing color, texture, & pattern to the work. After years of fermentation, three once separate parts of her life, photography, quilting, and botany; now come together in the quilts.



The invention of the Jacquard machine in 1804 revolutionized textile manufacturing. The machine used a sequence of punched cards that automated the weaving process – this proved to be an early step in the history of computing hardware. Overseen by humans in enormous factories, weaving was no longer done by hand. The burgeoning industry employed unskilled or minimally skilled women of all ages to run these machines in what came to be known as sweat shops for their dehumanizing, unregulated and often dangerous work environments. How the roles of women were and continue to be defined in relation to modern technologies and a desire for the latest model, especially machines of convenience and efficiency, is at the heart of Ten Most Wanted Women and its larger umbrella project, Hall of Portraits from The History of Machines.

My process begins with collages that digitally manipulate historical images that retain the halftone signatures of the mass-produced image and incorporate my own photography from my object collection (e.g., used irons, telephones, vacuum cleaners). The collages are printed large on canvas by a commercial billboard company, and then I paint around the hybrid female forms with layers of acrylic paint. I perform repetitive domestic actions by dragging tools across the surfaces or imprinting the textures of household goods (disposable paper towels, machine-made fabrics, guest bathroom hand towels) into the paint or my actions employ devices such as window cleaning squeegees and DIY wood graining tools. The images are then photographed and reimagined to create the oversized portrait heads that comprise Ten Most Wanted Women. The new digital files are sent to a textile factory to be transformed, this time into woven cloth by the mechanical hand of the Jacquard machine.

It is not just about creating art but about the story behind it, the messages conveyed, and the motivation of anticipating the final product, which drives me back to the studio day after day. Regardless of my canvas, my primary fuel for creating art comes from appreciating the beauty of God's creation that surrounds me daily. Focusing on intricate details enables me to pause, observe, and add every necessary brushstroke. The most rewarding responses come from those who see my work as a game-changer in the custom sneaker community, pushing boundaries and redefining what art on footwear can be. I paint to transform the multitude of ideas in my mind into tangible forms that can ignite inspiration in others.



Based in Philadelphia, Porrini first plays with the idea of sayings from her childhood. Familiar songs, playground banter, and common quotes from our elders all relay a message through the works. Following sketches and paper replicas of what will soon be made into 3D forms, she then introduces vibrant colors onto ceramic shapes incorporating familiar illustrations and characters all drawn by hand. These images represent a time and a place that seemed so grand and a childhood that felt never ending. Even now as adults we can all look at the artists work and remember a time when we once connected with the objects being represented. Her sculptures never show the complete structure. This results in the fact that the artist can easily imagine her own interpretation without being hindered by the historical reality. Playing between memory and experience, she tries to increase the dynamic between audience and author by playing on emotions and investigating the duality that develops through different interpretations of the same story.

Here, as a sculpture held taut by tension and compression, the ropes themselves become the spectacle. The symbiotic tensegrity system is a wry nod to the push and pull of a market that anticipates demand and an obliging consumer base.

Richard Hamilton is often credited as the creator of the first Pop Art. But Stuart Davis could be called a forefather. One hundred years ago he made his painting of the Odol Mouthwash bottle- a portrait of a consumer product, now in the MOMA. A nostalgic release of the old Odol bottle in Germany prompted me to make this Homage to Stuart Davis. Like Davis, I often commingle abstraction with representation. For me, it is a metaphor for uncertainty.

In daily life we prioritize. We manage time, save time, avoid wasting time. We buy health insurance, fire insurance, car insurance, travel insurance, liability insurance, flood insurance: all to protect us against the unpredictable. Then, a disaster (like COVID-19) sweeps us out of our routine, and we are reminded of our precarious position in a broader ecosystem.

Drawing is immediate: no mixing, no clean up. I can respond to the world's injustice, sort out the figures from the grounds, make discoveries.

What is a photograph? Is the photographic negative the closest photographic approximation to reality (while a print is one step removed)? What is the importance of a photographic negative in the digital age other than a reminiscence or memory of a bygone era? Can the overlooked photographic negative stand on its own as a piece of art? Can I turn a negative into a positive? Are my artistic ambitions the equivalent of a bad pun? Warner Herzog, facing failure, once said "If I abandon this project, I would be a man without dreams and I don't want to live like that." And so we dream. An afterimage is the first thing we see when we close our eyes.

These photographic negative Afterimages were discovered to have an unexpected nostalgic beauty all their own - lingering memories of moments passed, previously captured on camera. One can stare at the center of these images for 30 seconds (without blinking or moving) and then look at a white object (or close your eyes and tilt your head back) to create the afterimage effect, now a fleeting memory of a photograph, a waking dream.
