## Let the Art Be First

It seems rather courageous when one realizes all the problems around being an artist, the personal, the emotional, the technical, that three persons would agree that the theme of their show should be "Let There Be Art." However, the fact that each of these persons has struggled to make art, has come to live in Washington is not the subject of this exhibit. The subject is: let there be art for Sylvia, Denise, and Joyce, primarily. In fact, Joyce Wellman mentioned that she came to Washington some six years ago not only to assess her art, but to be able to perform it.

It is with similar interest that the others stayed in Washington following a very strong line of Washington women who have worked here. It is to all of these women that this exhibit is dedicated. Yet, it is a particular celebration of Black History Month that is also before us. All three women are artists. All three women are black. So, "let the art be first." This show is a rallying point for them in 1985, for staying in Washington and for being intent upon resolving the personal and emotional conflicts that center in art.

I personally hope that everyone observing this show will realize, as I have come to realize, that the art is superb, of first rank, of great depth and significance, regardless of the pluralities.

It should be first and it is first.

I am working with tightly composed fragments of architectural elements, furniture, picture frames, etc. The viewer has some type of personal history with these generic objects when they are whole. In visually compressing and overlapping these fragments, I am recreating coded, dreamlike recognition of oblique memories.

The approach to my work is to create imagery that can be felt by the implosion of color, form, and space. By fusing that imagery into a communication that is abstract, I induct the viewer to perceive a combination of views, discoveries, and feelings. I seek to bring to the viewer a world which we feel but cannot see: a world that exists to nurture us beyond and on to the Path of the Spirit.

The concept overriding my work is the artist's alter-ego in metamorphosis. For me this means the artist's ability to go inside and touch base with that other self in us all that is interfacing subconsciously with our environment.


