

"Toronto-born and South Bronx-based Mike Childs has been working in New York since 1995... Patterns and contiguous space interface, interlace, and proliferate like so many passing surfaces and colors, changing with the passage of time or the panorama of a gaze. Walls, graffiti, signage, and bridges of the Bronx all began to fold into the flux of Childs's images during his time living in the neighborhood. The paintings are committedly non-objective, use geometry and color to explore compositional possibilities, but evoke Childs's experiential surroundings, not literally, but rather through abstract, pictorial themes."










1000lbs, 2017 Acrylic & spray paint on canvas 64 x 79 inches



Here Today Gone Tomorrow #4, 2018 Pencil on watercolor paper 22 x 30 inches






Off 2 Work, 2023 Acrylic and crushed stone on canvas 16 x 28 inches







Weimar, 2023 Acrylic and crushed stone with spray paint on canvas  $33.5 \times 41.5$  inches

Mike Childs (b.1965) creates paintings on canvas and works on paper based on his focus on abstraction originated from observation. His images reference the colors, structures, patterns and textures of urban architecture. In discussing his work, he points out the pictures stem from an observation of the urban environment influenced by the encroaching forces of nature. He finds inspiration as well from his studies in sociology and music and references his own architectural photographs of what he calls an "urban entropy". Childs' special relationship with the paints he uses includes working with gathered materials such as native New York Black Walnut husks, local soil, and crushed sedimentary stones gathered in a local Bronx park. Spray paint is also often added to the final layer highlighting the textural surfaces in sections of the paintings incorporating the surfaces of the painted walls in his South Bronx studio neighborhood.

Childs was born to American and Canadian parents in Toronto, Canada, and lives and works out of the Bronx, New York. He studied painting and philosophy at the University of Guelph in Guelph, Ontario; and completed an MFA at Florida State University in Tallahassee, Florida, in 1993. He was awarded a post graduate position where he painted, taught drawing and studied the murals and architecture of Florence, Italy.
