Hans Petersen is a Danish-born autodidact international artist. He attended the Royal Danish Academy of Art, in Copenhagen to study architecture. While there, Hans' love for abstract expressionism intensified with inspiration from the mid-20th century CoBrA movement, especially Danish artist Asgar Jorn.

Hans began his professional life as a graphic designer, moving to NYC in 1976 and becoming a principal and creative director for a successful design firm. He relocated to Charlotte, NC in 1991 where his innovative graphic design style distinguished the International Home Furnishings Center's promotional material for over 15 years.


In 2005, Hans pursued life as a full-time painter. True to his CoBrA roots, Hans' work is not limited to a single style. Rather he prefers painting series that have a continuity of his vision.


Women and Abstracts, my third solo show, focuses on these two favored themes.

Whence came the Women featured in Hans' solo show?


The *Women of Eccentric Personas* is Hans' most expansive series whose portraits of complex personalities and colorful expressions boast passion and optimism. While primitive and raw the *Women of Eccentric Personas* are very much human, captivating, and unconventionally beautiful.







Fashion advertising has interested me since my graphic design work in New York City. Decades later, inspired by the pages of Vogue, *Fashion Icons* is an homage of representational abstract paintings that express my story about six fashion icons, painted on a large and small scale.



During the 2020 home confinement for Covid-19, I was yearning for the fun and boldness of the Sixties graphic design and art movements. Online I rediscovered issues of Mobilia, a Danish design journal that I devoured in the 60s until it ceased publication in 1984. The *Pure Joy*_series interprets the Sixties color vibe through a feminine lens with a minimalist structure.





The Conversation series explores the changing mood of a conversation through color and graphic elements. Which conversations are congenial, unbalanced but amicable, emotional, or indicative of storm clouds rising? You be the judge...

Total Abstraction unleashed bold color and action painting on a larger scale. Adding layers of color and numerous graphic elements checked all my boxes for fun and joyful!


